

From the Desk of Fr. Doug

Our Father...thy kingdom come...on earth

Richard Rohr has been one of many people who talk about the "kin"dom meaning that one of the main messages of Jesus is that we are to be in relationship with God and one another, that all of us belong to a global community. Rohr uses the word 'kin'dom to describe this. We are all related and called to relationship in the human family. There is no enemy, no "other."

I used to think this was a great insight. Indeed the main thrust of Jesus teaching is that we are called to live in community (which is why you can't stay home and pray alone and call yourself a disciple of Jesus).

I'm gonna go out on a limb here and say that I'm having second thoughts about the emphasis Rohr gives to this.

What is the Old Testament about? It's about the rise and fall and the in-betweens of a country, a holy nation, and the kingdom of Israel. Yes, the kingdom, the Chosen People, the Promised Land, the country given to the Jews by God, the land given to Abraham, the Jewish kingdom conquered by the Assyrians in 722 BC and by the Babylonians in 586BC. In other words, the Old Testament is all about God is involved in politics of Israel and how God expects that nation to follow His will. To emphasize how we are related to each other through kinship, is to overlook the political history of the Jewish people, maybe CJT – Critical Jewish Theory?

This topic came up in my priest group the last time we met. Some mentioned that people say they don't like when the priest "talks politics." Of course, when people say that, they mean they don't like it when the priest talks about *their* politics, unless of course, you are anti-abortion, in which case all the stops come out to support whatever politician agrees with that.

In the Old Testament, when the kingdom of

Israel neglected the alien, the widow and the orphan, God sent his wrath upon them. In the Old Testament when the kingdom of Israel, neglected the poor, caused scandal to children, did not provide for all in the community, the nation incurred God's wrath. When cities turned away from God, he sent prophets like Jonah to a city like Nineveh. The prophet Isaiah sums up the call to nations nicely when he describes the spirit of God coming down upon him to 'bring glad tidings to the poor, to heal the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to captives, and release to prisoners, to announce a year of favor from the Lord. The year of favor was a time in which economic injustices were remedied by redistributing the land equally among all the Jewish people.

So, when a kingdom, or a country or a political party violates the laws of God, the clergy must speak out. This is the criticism given to Pope Pius XII when he made a tacit deal with Hitler. He did not speak out. That's the most extreme example of course. But any time a country or a party violates the human rights of any individual, any time a country or political party advocates for policies that disenfranchise the poor, that causes more undue harm to the marginalized, that promote policies that give more to the wealthy and less to the poor, that does not revise its penal system, that prohibits migrants and refugees from finding sanctuary in our country, that promotes hate, then the church must speak. And of course, God in the OT and Jesus in the NT condemns similar sins committed by religious institutions and religious leaders as much as He condemns nations.

We belong to many communities; our family, our neighborhood, our city, our religion, our country. The Gospel speaks to each of these realities around us. We must speak as well w\if we are to proclaim the Gospel.

Mt. 10:4 Jesus went to all the towns and villages, proclaiming the Gospel of the Kingdom.
