OUR MISSION STATEMENT





From Fr. Doug's Desk.....







Human Made Climate Change

The science behind climate change is very simple: Carbon Dioxide (CO2), when emitted into the atmosphere traps heat and CO2 will remain in the atmosphere for several hundred years. Global emissions of Carbon Dioxide (CO2,) the most significant gas, have grown exponentially since the beginnings of the Industrial Revolution in the early 1800s.

What is important to know about climate change is that it is measureable. Our air is not an empty space of nothing. It is made up of all kinds of elements, mostly oxygen and carbon dioxide. As we learned in grade school, animals breathe in oxygen and emit carbon dioxide. Trees and oceans absorb carbon dioxide and emit oxygen. The global average carbon dioxide set a new record high in 2022: 417.06 parts per million. This is a scientific measureable fact.

Most CO2 emissions arise from the combustion of fossil fuels (coal, oil, and natural gas), which human life on our planet has come to rely on. CO2 is absorbed by trees in the act of photosynthesis, and by the oceans. But our increased dependency on fossil fuels has overwhelmed the natural protections afforded by forests and seas. Atmospheric CO2 is rising, and now exceeds 410 parts per million (ppm), compared to preindustrial levels of about 280 ppm. And there are now 8 billion people on our planet – up from 1 billion in 1830s – and their demand for energy, which fossil fuel provides, continues to grow.

In addition to CO2, about 30% of heat trapping emissions comes from Methane, Nitrous Oxide, and gases used in coolants.

The warming pf the planet is already causing sea level rise due to melting of the ice sheets of Greenland and Antarctica, loss of other glaciers, reduced winter snowpack, and thermal expansion of the oceans (warm water is less dense than cold water). Future sea level rise could be 6.5 feet or more by 2100.

Experts predict a 2°C (3.6°F) rise since the dawn of the Industrial Revolution will cause irreversible loss in global ecosystem functions and services required for food production, health, and habitable settlements. We are already halfway there.

Climate change is affecting current weather patterns, with more heat extremes, more droughts in some areas and flooding in others, as well as increased forest fires. It is the poor who are disproportionately affected by climate change. Climate change threatens the world's food supply.

Floods and droughts brought on by climate change make it harder to produce food. As a result, the price of food increases, and access becomes more and more limited, putting many at higher risk of hunger.

Undernutrition is the largest health impact of climate change in the 21st century. The number of undernourished people in the world has been increasing since 2014, reaching nearly 690 million — almost 9% of the global population — in 2019. The vast majority live in low- and middle-income countries — research shows hunger to be most prevalent in Africa and rising fastest in Latin America and the Caribbean. The number of undernourished people in the Latin America and Caribbean region increased by 9 million between 2015 and 2019.

Rising sea levels, extreme weather events and prolonged drought force millions of people to lose or move away from their homes every year in search of food, water, shelter or jobs.

Nearly 70% of all new displacements in the first six months of last year were the result of weather-related disasters, with a total of 9.8 million people around the world driven from their homes by shocks like drought, hurricanes and landslides — around 50,000 people every day.

Meanwhile, gradual changes brought on by deforestation, overgrazing and decreased rainfall slowly transform pastures to dust, destroy crops and kill livestock, effectively challenging the livelihoods of millions of farmers. Many of these families are forced to leave their homes behind in search of basic necessities and new work.


